

Lowlands

According to Hugill, this was originally a pumping song and later used at windlass and capstan. Its 'dead lover' theme definitely originated in Scotland. The tune has a Negro touch about it and likely passed through the shanty mart of the Gulf Ports. Hugill views it more as a shore-ballad and considers the words to be unusually sentimental for seamen - even so it was clearly sung at work on board ship.
